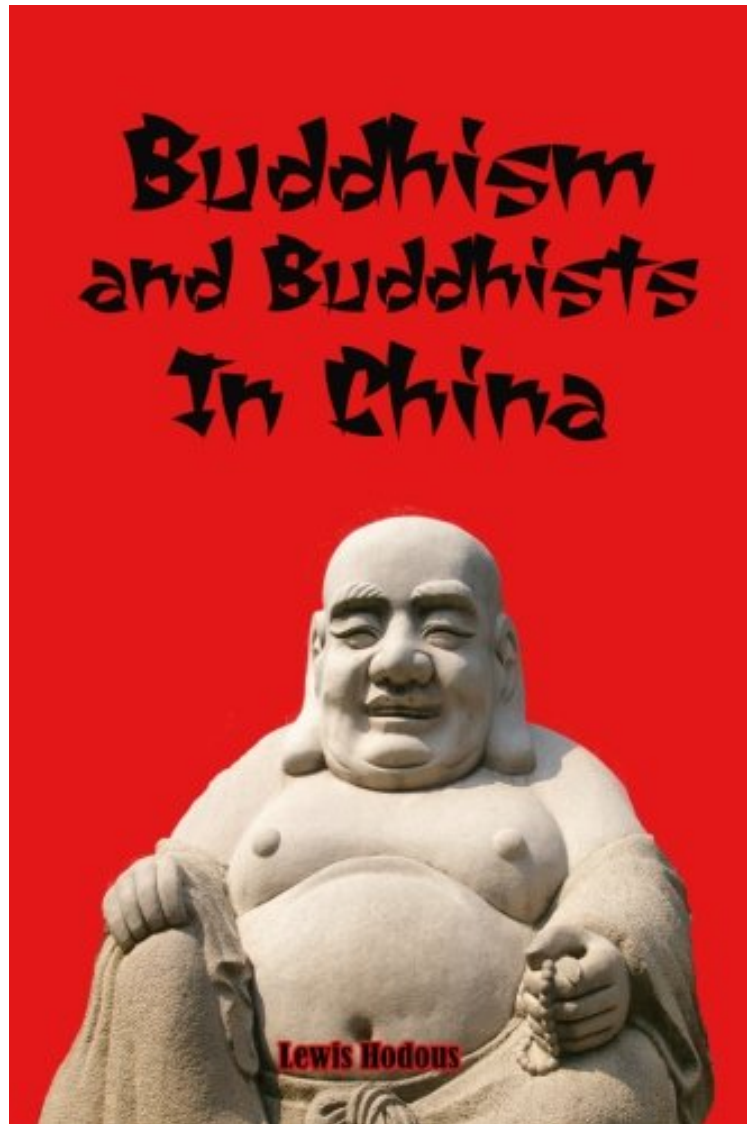

After the Moghul incursion into the Northern Indian Subcontinent, Buddhism disappeared from India and was entirely forgotten there. But some of the lost books of this time were preserved in Chinese and later translated into other languages.
