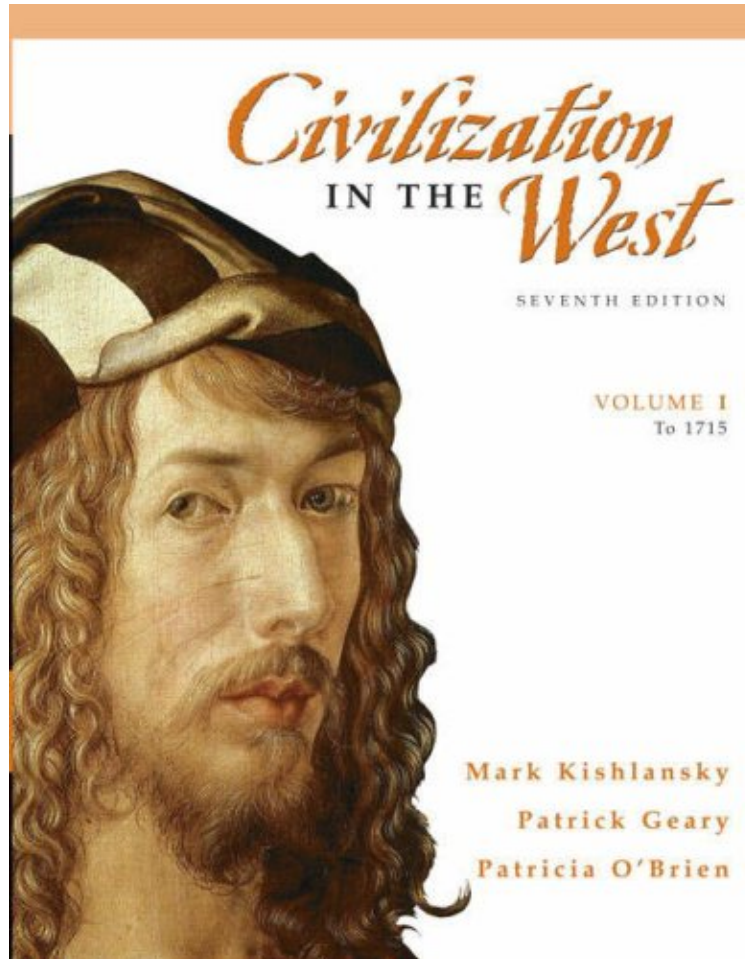

It lacks depth in many areas but this is to be expected of any textbook which seeks to chronicle the history of an entire continent through a period of 500 years.It is written in what I would consider a very readable style which allows for students to really become engaged in the grand narrative of history.Really better to be read along with the other course materials to develop what would hopefully be a deeper understanding of the time. Certain chapters have a more social/cultural focus which is a good change from the political

driven narrative, but they are lacking in depth of discussion on the differing nature of the individual countries within Europe. It really comes down to what you expect. Before joining the Harvard Faculty he taught for sixteen years at the University of Chicago where he was a member of the Committee on Social Thought. Professor Kishlansky is a specialist on seventeenth-century English political history and has written, among other works, *A Monarchy Transformed*, *The Rise of the New Model Army and Parliamentary Selection: Social and Political Choice in Early Modern England*. From 1984-1991 he was editor of the *Journal of British Studies*. He is currently writing a history of the reign of Charles I entitled *The Death of Kings*.
