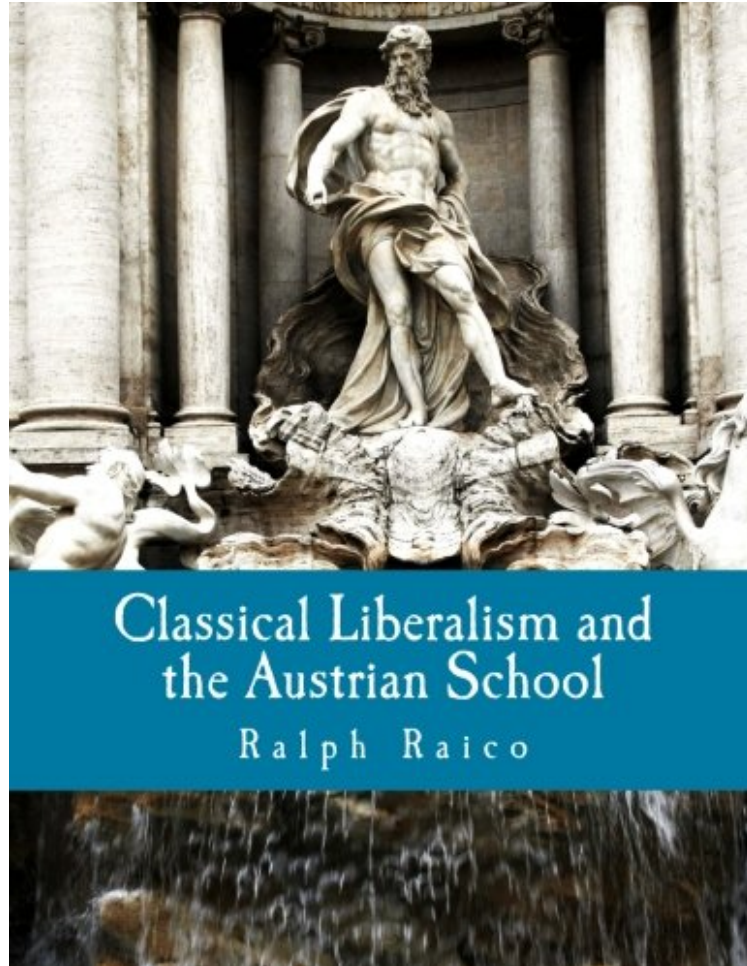

I always enjoy his work, but almost as satisfying as his works are the bibliographies, which are a treasure trove of valuable readings on classical liberalism. This book itself is a fairly quick read, but is packed to the gills with information. The format is a bit choppy, but again it is essays, and not a contiguous linear work on the entire history of the Austrian School or liberalism itself. Furthermore, this book in and of itself is not necessarily intended to be an exhaustive history or general narrative. It is instead various essays on specific topics and individuals with the overall theme. Overall, certainly an entertaining, interesting, and valuable read. Of course, it goes without saying that if more people understood the concepts discussed herein, what a peace-loving, freedom-loving, wonderful world this

would be.
