From Library JournalThis is a detailed and careful study of Inca and Andean religion from 1532 (the Spanish invasion) to about 1660 (when Inca religion had merged into ancestral Andean religion, but before Andean religion underwent massive change). It relies largely on Spanish accounts of native religion--a necessary limitation that MacCormack explicitly discusses. This permits focus on the religious experience of those invaded as perceived by and affected by the invaders.
