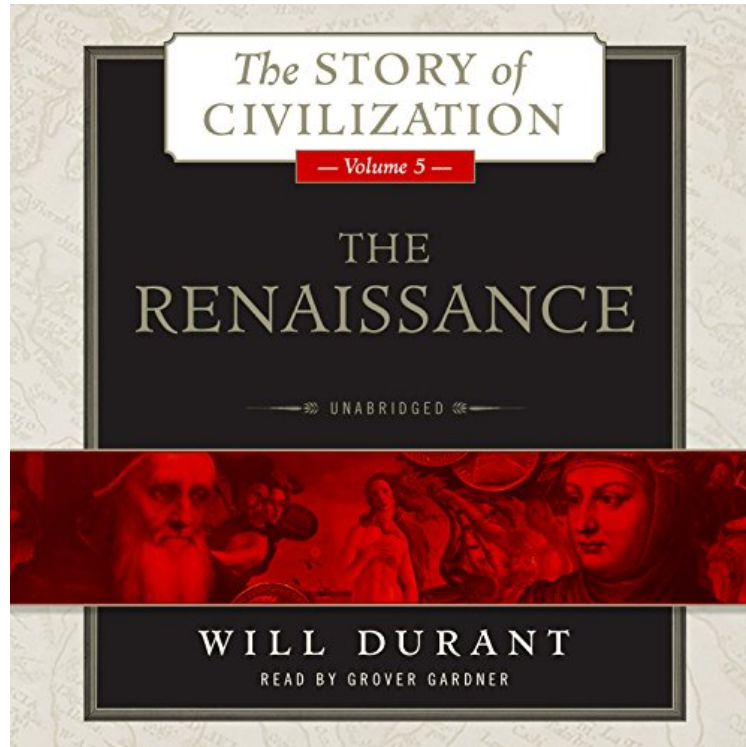

By Al Singh This is my least favorite book in the Story of Civilization series, but it is still a five star book. Most histories of the Renaissance tend to focus on art and artists; so does this one, which slows down the narrative considerably, but there are also fascinating accounts of princes and popes that liven up the story. The question must be asked: does great art make a civilization great, or does it lead to its decline and downfall? Other nations that have not flourished so brilliantly in the arts have been more politically, economically, and militarily successful. And is it true, as Durant asserts, that "money is the root of civilization"? This is a stimulating and

provocative book, despite its preoccupation with visual art, and much more accessible to the layman than most other works on the subject. He and his wife were awarded the Pulitzer Prize for General Nonfiction in 1968 for Rousseau and Revolution, and he was a recipient of the Presidential Medal of Freedom. Durant spent over forty years writing the critically acclaimed eleven-volume "Story of Civilization", the later volumes with the help of his wife, Ariel. He sought to revitalize history by unifying and humanizing the great body of historical knowledge, which had become voluminous and fragmented into esoteric subcategories.
